EDITORIAL

Past quarter of the Jubilee Year: 2025, April to June, had been definitely an eventful one for all of us. Globally, we suffered the loss of our Holy Father,

Pope Francis, who passed away at the Vatican, at the age of 88, on Easter Monday (April 21, 2025). His death marked the end of a historic papacy defined by humility, compassion, and a strong emphasis on mercy, dialogue, and care for the poor and the environment.

Born Jorge Mario Bergoglio in Buenos Aires, Argentina, he was elected Pope in 2013 and quickly became a beloved global figure for his pastoral style and commitment to reform within the Church. His papacy was notable for addressing contemporary issues such as climate change, economic inequality, interfaith dialogue, and the role of the Church in a changing world.

Pope Francis leaves behind a legacy of simplicity, deep spirituality, and a call for the Church to go to the margins of society, echoing the Gospel's call to love and serve all.



Following his death, Catholics around the world entered a period of mourning, with funeral rites taking place in St. Peter's Basilica. Pope Leo XIV is known for his pastoral heart, theological depth, and dedication to dialogue and evangelization. The name "Leo" recalls the legacy of previous Popes Leo, especially St. Leo the Great, a pope remembered for his courage, doctrine, and defence of the Church.

Pope Leo XIV's election has been welcomed by Catholics worldwide as a sign of continuity and renewal, with many hopeful for a pontificate that will uphold the Church's teachings while taking on modern challenges with wisdom and compassion.

ASK YOUR QUESTION:

Question: Dear Father, Pope Francis has died, now how will the Church elect a new Pope? I would like to know how a new Pope is elected in the Catholic Church.

On May 7, 2025, the Catholic Church commenced a significant chapter in its history with the initiation of the papal conclave to elect the 267th pope, following the passing of Pope Francis on April 21 at the age of 88. This conclave is notable for its unprecedented diversity and size, reflecting the global nature of the Church today.

A total of 133 cardinal electors, representing 71 countries, have convened in the Sistine Chapel. This marks the most geographically diverse and largest group of electors in the Church's history—108 of whom were



appointed by Pope Francis himself. The eyes of the world now turn to the Vatican—not in anticipation of politics, but of a profound spiritual discernment.

When a pope dies or resigns, many assume that what follows is a political campaign. But the election of a new pope is not a contest for power. It is a solemn moment when the Church listens—through silence, tradition, and centuries of wisdom—for the whisper of the Holy Spirit.



Let us now walk through this ancient and holy process.

1. What is a Conclave?: The word conclave comes from Latin: cum clave— “with a key.” The cardinals are literally locked inside a space so they can discern without distraction or influence. It is a time of prayer, reflection, and silence.
2. The Rulebook-*Universi Dominici Gregis*: The procedures are governed by *Universi Dominici Gregis*, an Apostolic Constitution issued by Pope John Paul II in 1996. It outlines the rules to be followed during the *sedevacante* (the vacant seat) and the election process.
3. The Death or Resignation of a Pope - *Sede Vacante*: The election process begins with either the death or resignation of a pope. The Holy See becomes *sede vacante*, and the College of Cardinals takes over ordinary administration until a new pope is elected.
4. The *Novemdiales* - Mourning and Discernment: A nine-day mourning period (*novemdiales*) follows the death of a pope. During this time, cardinals celebrate Mass together and hold daily meetings known as General Congregations to prepare for the conclave.
5. Breaking the Ring of the Fisherman: The Ring of the Fisherman, which bore the popes seal, is ceremonially destroyed. This act marks the formal end of the previous pontificate and prevents misuse of papal authority.
6. Sealing of the Papal Apartments: The camerlengo (the cardinal appointed to oversee the temporal goods of the church and administration of the Holy See during *sede vacante*) seals the papal apartments—symbolizing that no one owns the office. It is not inherited; it is given anew through divine guidance and ecclesial discernment.
7. Who Are the Electors?: Only cardinals under the age of 80 on the day the *sede vacante* begins may vote. There can be up to 120 electors (though this number is sometimes exceeded with papal permission).
8. Where Do the Cardinals Stay?: The cardinals reside at the Domus Sanctae Marthae, a residence within Vatican City. They are escorted to and from the Sistine Chapel under strict security, with all communication cut off.
9. Where Is the Conclave Held—and Why?: The Sistine Chapel has hosted the conclave since 1878. Its fresco of Michelangelo’s Last Judgment looms over the electors—a reminder of their accountability before God.
10. Secrecy and Oaths: A Sacred Responsibility: Before entering the conclave, all participants—cardinals and support staff alike, take a solemn oath of secrecy. Breach of this oath results in automatic excommunication.



11. **No Contact with the Outside World:** Inside the conclave, the cardinals are cut off completely from external contact. No phones, newspapers, radios, or internet. This ensures freedom from political and media pressures.
12. **Extra Omnes and the Meditation: Listening Before Choosing:** The conclave officially begins with the declaration "Extra Omnes"—"Everyone Out." After this, a spiritual meditation preached by a selected cleric. He reflects on the needs of the Church, the world, and the qualities needed in the new pope. It is a sacred and sober moment of guidance before voting begins.
13. **How Is a Pope Elected?:** A cardinal must receive a two-thirds majority to be elected. This requirement ensures unity and prevents division. If no result is reached after several rounds, the cardinals continue until consensus is formed.
14. **How Do They Cast Their Vote? A Sacred Act of Conscience:** Each cardinal writes a name on a ballot inscribed with the Latin phrase: "*Eligo in Summum Pontificem*" ("I elect as Supreme Pontiff...")
They walk one by one to the altar, under the fresco of the Last Judgment, raise their hand, & swear:
"I call as my witness Christ the Lord, who will be my judge, that my vote is given to the one who before God I think should be elected."

The ballots are collected in a special urn, then counted and read aloud by three scrutineers. When finished, the ballots are threaded with needle and string, tied together, and burned.

15. **The Smoke Signals: Black or White?:** If no pope is elected, the smoke from the chimney is black (*fumatanera*). When a pope is chosen, white smoke (*fumatabianca*) signals to the world: *Habemus Papam*. This tradition began in the 15th century and remains one of the most iconic images of the conclave.
16. **The Role of the Holy Spirit:** The Holy Spirit doesn't whisper names into ears. Instead, He moves through prayer, dialogue, and conscience. The entire Church is called to pray during the conclave, invoking the Spirit to guide the electors.
17. **Daily Voting Rounds:** Up to four votes are cast per day—two in the morning and two in the afternoon. This continues until one candidate reaches the necessary majority.
18. **What Happens When One Is Elected?:** When a cardinal receives enough votes, the Dean asks: "Do you accept your canonical election as Supreme Pontiff?" If he accepts, he is asked: "By what name shall you be called?"
He is then taken to the "Room of Tears" to change into white papal garments. Many popes have wept in that room, overwhelmed by the responsibility now upon them.



19. “*Habemus Papam*” – We Have a Pope!: The Senior Cardinal Deacon steps onto the balcony of St. Peter’s Basilica and announces: “*Annuntio vobis gaudium magnum: Habemus Papam!*” (“I announce to you a great joy: We have a Pope!”) He reveals the new pope’s chosen name. A moment of silence follows. The Church breathes again.
20. The First Blessing: The newly elected pope appears on the balcony and offers his first *Urbi et Orbi* blessing— “to the city and to the world.” It is not a show. It is a real, apostolic blessing—a gift to the faithful, and a beginning.

Conclusion

The conclave is not about ambition or politics. It is about humility, prayer, and sacred responsibility. In a noisy world, the conclave teaches us the power of silence. In a divided world, it reminds us that unity is still possible through faith.

Let us be proud of our Church—not for

its wealth or riches, but for its unwavering commitment to listen, to discern, and to follow the path of Christ – “You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church.”

Epilogue: The Work of the Spirit

“No confusion. No argument. No tension.

No jealousy. No division. No business. No bitterness.

No sadness remains.

The whole world, in silence and awe, accepts the new Holy Father.”

This is the Catholic Church—one family, united not by opinions or politics, but by the Blood of Christ, poured out and sprinkled upon the Rock of Peter. Who could not love such a Church? Who would want to walk away from a Church founded not by men, but by Christ Himself?

We own nothing. We control nothing. We simply stand in tears, overwhelmed by the quiet and majestic working of the Holy Spirit.

A Pope Who Became a Man: Walking with Shoes of the Poor

They say you can read a person's soul by looking at their shoes. If that is true, then the image of Pope Francis will need to be redrawn – not in robes of gold or shoes of red velvet, but in worn-out leather, faded and creased by years of walking among the people. His shoes were not of a prince but of a pilgrim – simple, torn, and ordinary. They were the same shoes he wore as a Jesuit priest. And they tell us everything we need to know about the man who chose to lead the Church by stepping downward, not upward.

His Lifestyle Choices: Humility in the White Cassock – and Worn Shoes: From the very first day of his papacy, Pope Francis made radical choices. He refused the papal palace and lived in a modest room. He rode in an economy car. He dined with workers. But more revealing than all these was the fact that he never

changed his shoes. Even in death, his personal inheritance amounted to just \$100. In a world where power is often dressed in excess, Francis reminded us that authority rooted in simplicity is more powerful than any throne. His life stands as a direct challenge to those entrusted with care – leaders, clergy, politicians, and even we.

His Language: A Heart That Speaks Simply: Francis spoke the way people needed to hear – not in lofty theological language, but in parables of today. He talked about broken elevators, soup kitchens, stray dogs, and burned-out priests. He once said, “God is not afraid of our wounds.” In his language, he brought God closer – not as an idea but as a living, walking presence in the streets of suffering. His words were bridges, not walls. And in those bridges,



people felt seen, forgiven, and welcomed.

His Actions: Kneeling Before the Margins: But he didn't just speak. He bent down – literally and symbolically. From washing the feet of prisoners, to embracing the sick and disfigured, Francis broke the invisible glass that separates “the sacred” from “the suffering.” If seeing the shoes of Pope Francis unsettles you, it may be because there are shoes in your life that need changing – shoes that must come down from platforms and walk where the poor and broken live. His actions were never dramatic. They were ordinary acts done with extraordinary love.

His Papacy's Central Themes: Mercy, Ecology, and Inclusion: Francis didn't just reform the Church; he reshaped its heart. With *Laudato Si'*, he reminded the world that the planet is not a backdrop to salvation but part of it – that the earth groans with us, not apart from us. With *Amoris Laetitia*, he embraced broken families with understanding rather than judgment. With the Jubilee of Mercy, he called the Church to open doors – not just metaphorically, but physically and pastorally. His vision of God's love was truly universal – spilling beyond religion, politics, species, and climate.

His Resistance to Power: A Quiet Earthquake: In refusing luxury, Francis also refused the invisible chains of power and prestige. He once warned against “spiritual worldliness” – a disease far worse than secularism. He didn't condemn the world; he questioned the comfort of those who claimed to lead it.

His critique of clericalism and corruption wasn't aggressive but clear. He taught that real authority is not exercised from above, but shared from below. His simplicity was not naivety – it was a revolution in soft tones.

His Humanity as Holiness: The Saint Who Stayed Human: Perhaps the greatest miracle of Francis was that he never stopped being human. He joked, confessed his faults, took afternoon naps, and admitted when he didn't have all the answers. He once said, “I am a sinner, whom the Lord has looked upon.” That humility made him relatable. That vulnerability made him holy. He was a Pope, yes – but more deeply, he remained a man – a man who saw himself in the faces of others.

A Name and a Life Lived Fully: Francis took his name from St. Francis of Assisi – the saint of poverty, peace, and creation. And he lived that name not just in words but in every breath, until his last. He understood that to follow Christ is to descend – to become less so others may be more. In doing so, he never ceased to be the Pope. But more importantly, he never ceased to be a man.

When Shoes Speak: The shoes of Pope Francis may never be displayed in glass cases. But they will live in the memory of our conscience. If they make us uncomfortable, perhaps it is because we too are being called – not to admire him, but to imitate him. His life is a mirror to every heart, a question to every leader, and an invitation to every Christian: Will you dare to walk in shoes that touch the ground?



JESUS CHRIST: OUR UNITY

[Based on the Decree on Ecumenism, Vatican II, Unitatis Redintegratio (Restoration of Unity) Promulgated by Pope Paul VI on 21 November 1964.]

In an orchestra play, types of musical instruments produce their sound and when blended together well it gives harmonious music. In the similar manner, the Church is the visible sign of unity in this world. Unity has always been the nature and the goal of the Church. The Church founded by Jesus Christ is one. Occasionally, we come across a few difficulties and differences in the ways of thinking and acting of some church leaders. We experience divisions in the Church. Sometime, diverse expressions of our faith leads us to forget the very movement of the Church to unity which is to return to Jesus Christ and live in communion with God and one another.

The tendency to divide in the name of faith expression may lead us to work against the unity of the Church. Whatever the difference may be, what we need is the courage to become aware of what is happening within the Church and the reasons that hinders us to be united in Christ. It is true that the greater way to solve divisions is a deeper conversion towards Christ, since Christ is the way, the truth and the life. (John 14:6a). This is more important than to seek or to restore the visible unity of the Churches. Togetherness within the Churches certainly would help the Churches to pray together. Our model of prayer is the prayer of Jesus. The prayer of Jesus, "That they may be one" (John 17:21), is the prayer of unity signifies far more than institutional solidarity. But the undeniable challenge of every Christian is also to progress towards the fullness of unity and make it visible in the Church and in the world. This prayer for unity is the prayer for

spiritual journey to connect with the divine through love. Through this prayer Jesus shares the glory with His disciples given to Him by the Father and invites them to experience God's love in the same way that He does.

Decree on Ecumenism, Vatican II, *Unitatis Redintegratio* (Restoration of Unity) promulgated by Pope Paul VI on 21 November 1964, teaches us that Church is a communion of faith and Sacrament, which we can experience visibly and invisibly. We believe that this unity subsists in the Catholic Church as something she can never lose and it will continue to increase until the end of time (UR 4). This statement made by the Church does not exclude other Churches and Ecclesial Communities from the body of Christ rather it affirms our common faith in Jesus Christ and baptism (UR 3). We hold firm that the separated brothers and sisters through their faith and sacramental life participate in some way into the one Church and into the mystery of Christ. 'The Catholic Church is One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic,



yet it recognizes the elements of salvation that are found in other Churches' (The Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, Vatican II, *Lumen Gentium*, (Light of the Nations) 8, Promulgated by Pope Paul VI on 21 November 1964). Therefore, it is true that the quality of unity can also be found in other Churches and Ecclesial Communities.

The true goal of the unity is to gather all Christians in a common celebration of the Eucharist into the unity of the One and only Church which Christ bestowed from the beginning (UR 4). St Ignatius of Antioch affirms in his letter to the Trallians that "God stands for unity" and Eucharist creates unity in the Body of Christ and Eucharist is also the sign and person of unity in the Church. Our action to achieve this goal requires conviction and firm knowledge about the true teachings of the Church in spite of holding on to human judgment, wrong expression and wrong teachings. There is also always a need to promote and value the sound conscience that demands the common good for humanity. In this affair, prayer is the key foundation that will enrich us to know the will of Christ and not the will of humans. Prayer is also the foundation of our relationship with God. Through prayer we speak to God, listen to His words and open our hearts to Him and thus we become faithful and embrace unity.

The work of unity begins from within not from outside. The change of our heart is a step towards building unity. As the document *Unitatis Redintegratio* puts it "For, it is from newness of attitude, from self-denial and love that yearnings for unity take their rise and grow towards maturity...This change of heart and holiness of life, along with public and private prayer for the unity of Christians, should be regarded as the soul of the whole ecumenical movement" (7-8). This work of unity requires attentive listening to the word of God, right understanding of its teachings and

opening of our hearts to God in order to witness Christ faithfully. The greater requirement includes a change of heart through forgiveness and reconciliation. Having a common prayer or praying together for unity also important since Jesus says that, 'For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them' (Mt 18:20). Our Christian spirituality must be based wholly on the word of God because word of God is the foundation of Christian life.

Unitatis Redintegratio number 6 states that "Every renewal of the Church essentially consists in an increase of fidelity to her own calling". The true call of the Church is unity in the body of Christ. We are called to the one hope, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all (Eph 4:4-5). We need not shout at the top of our voice for unity because it emerges from within the voice of our hearts. We can embrace the virtue of humility, gentleness and prudence because they are the fundamental virtues proper to unity. To maintain true unity in the Church, society and family, the first imperative is to be humble, gentle, patient and loving toward one another. We are called to live a holy life. Our response towards holiness would bring us closer to Christ and to one another. Eventually, the fruits of our faith would reflect in our lives filled with love, joy, peace and regards for one another. Thus, as the Psalmist proclaims that "Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity....it is like the dew of Hermon, which falls on the mountains of Zion! For there the Lord has commanded the blessing, life forever" (Psalm 133:1) will come true. Unfortunately, unity cannot be achieved merely by human efforts alone. We need to rely on the power of the Holy Spirit to realize the wish and prayer of Jesus for unity. Therefore, working for unity is allowing the Holy Spirit to transform us and being able to bear all things, believe all things, hope all



things and endure all things solely for the love of Christ (1Cor 13:7).

As we are the “Pilgrims of hope” we need reformation, renewal and healing, so that we are united in Jesus Christ. Therefore, let our prayers be rooted on the prayer of Jesus Christ for unity. Let our prayer for unity be a prayer to know the will of God and not to change the will of God. Let it be a prayer to change ourselves because the change of heart and the renewal of our life is a necessary ways towards unity. Let us not cease to believe that the Holy Spirit always guides us

and moves our hearts in times of prayer. Therefore, let us be clear that the principle of unity is having communion with one another and the Triune God. For our life and unity we depend upon the love of the Father, the prayer of Christ and the action of the Holy Spirit. Jesus is our only hope and our hope is that Jesus would enable us to overcome every obstacle and heal every wound of our division. Jesus Christ is the head and centre of the unity and we, as humans can be one of instruments of Christ to promote unity, love, joy and peace in this world.

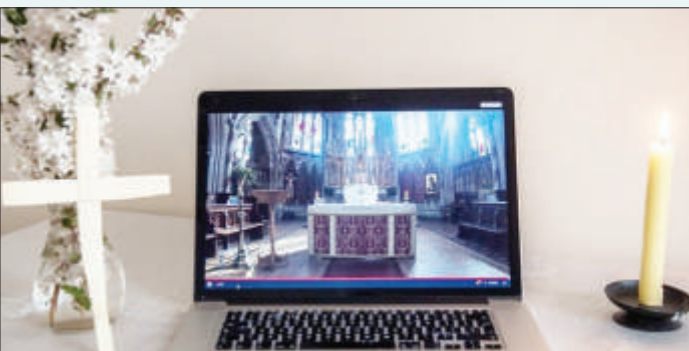

Church in India Issues Guidelines for Online Streaming of Liturgical Celebrations

BANGALORE, April 03, 2025 (CCBI): The Conference of Catholic Bishops of India (CCBI) has introduced new guidelines regulating the online transmission of Holy Mass and other liturgical celebrations. Titled

"Guidelines for the Electronic Transmission of the Celebration of the Eucharist and Other Liturgical Services", the document was officially issued on March 25, 2025, and made public on April 3, 2025.

Cardinal Filipe Neri Ferrão, President of the CCBI, emphasized the importance of maintaining the theological, spiritual, and liturgical integrity of online liturgical broadcasts. In a special circular to the faithful, he stated, "These Guidelines ensure that liturgical celebrations transmitted via electronic media retain their sacredness and



reverence. While online broadcasts offer spiritual benefits, they do not replace the ideal and normative form of physical participation in the liturgy, as affirmed by the Second Vatican Council in *Sacrosanctum Concilium* (n. 7)."

The Guidelines were formulated after extensive discussions during the 94th and 95th Executive Committee Meetings of the CCBI in May and September 2024 and received final approval at the 36th Plenary Assembly in February 2025. They are now binding on all bishops, priests, deacons, religious, and

laypersons involved in the electronic dissemination of liturgical celebrations within the Latin Church in India.

By setting clear norms for online liturgical broadcasts, the CCBI aims to preserve the sanctity of the Eucharist and foster deeper spiritual participation among the faithful, whether attending in person or through digital platforms.

Pope Francis has Died April 21 at the Age of 88

VATICAN CITY, April 21, 2025: The pope died at 7:35 a.m. Rome time, U.S. Cardinal Kevin J. Farrell, Chamberlain of the Holy Roman Church, announced. Pope Francis gave new energy to millions of Catholics - and caused concern for some - as he transformed the image of the papacy into a pastoral ministry based on personal encounters and strong convictions about mission, poverty, immigration and dialogue.

"His whole life was dedicated to the service of the Lord and his church," Cardinal Farrell said in a video announcement broadcast from the chapel of the Domus Sanctae Marthae, where Pope Francis lived and where he was recovering from pneumonia and respiratory infections. He had been released from Rome's Gemelli hospital



March 23 after more than five weeks of treatment.

Pope Francis "taught us to live the values of the Gospel with fidelity, courage and universal love, especially in favour of the poorest and most marginalized,"

Cardinal Farrell said. "With immense gratitude for his example as a true disciple of the Lord Jesus, we commend the soul of Pope Francis to the infinite merciful love of the Triune God."
